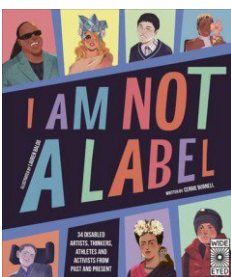

by Gabrielle Ford

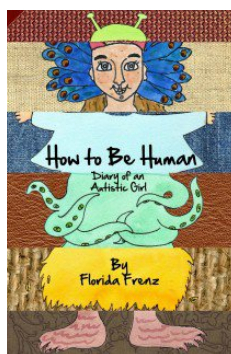

by Cerrie Burnell

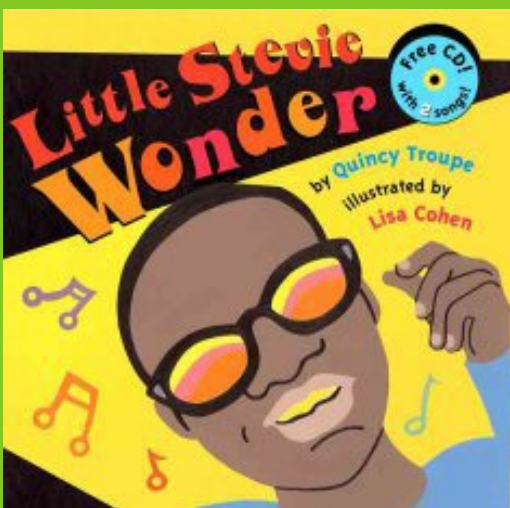

by Florida Frenz

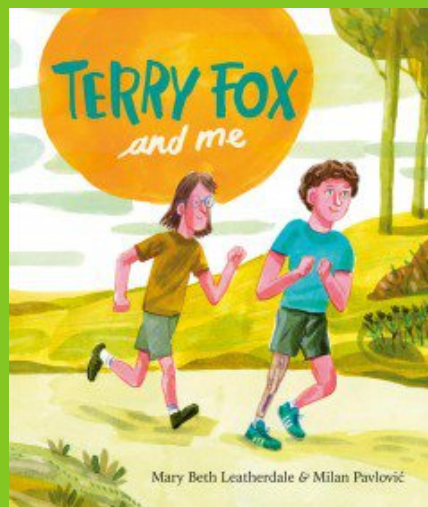
The author, an autistic teenager, explains how other autistic children can make friends, fit in, and deal with such issues as popularity, peer pressure, and bullying.

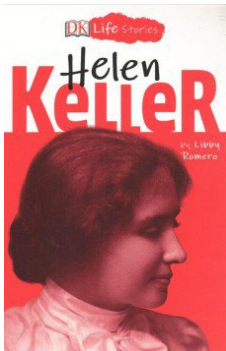
## Temple Grandin by Sy Montgomery

When Temple Grandin was born, her parents knew that she was different. Years later she was diagnosed with autism. While Temple's doctor recommended a hospital, her mother believed in her.



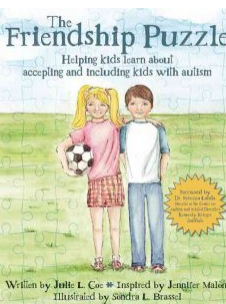
## Not So Different by Shane Burcaw

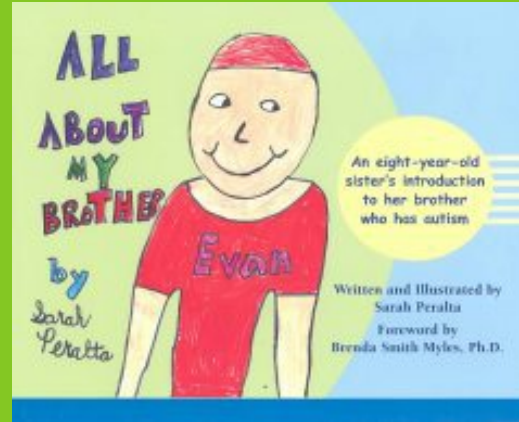
## Helen Keller by Libby Romero

## The Friendship Puzzle by Julie L. Coe

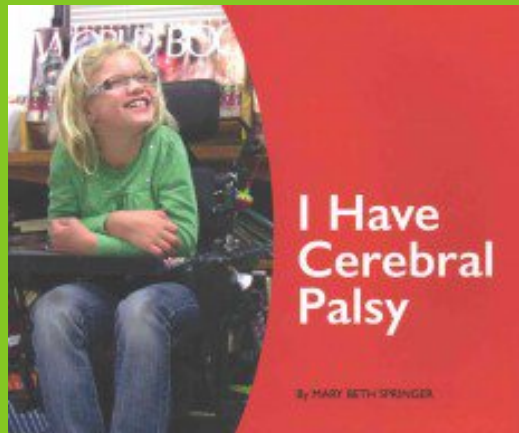

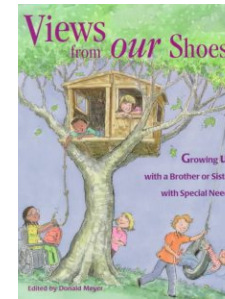
Features Sarah an eight year old girl who has grown up with and who, with her parents, has been involved in helping her younger brother with autism to learn.

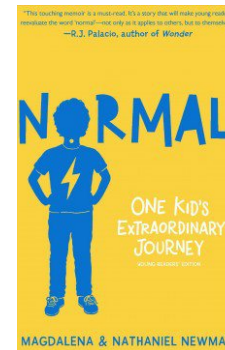

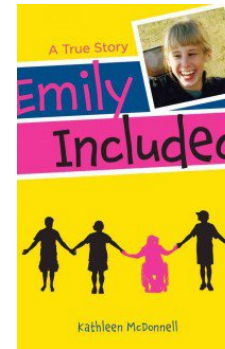
Views from Our Shoes provides family members, friends, and professionals with a better understanding of what it's like to have a sibling with a disability.
